

Financial Services and General Government Appropriations: FY2012 Budget Request Fact Sheet

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Overview

The Financial Services and General Government (FSGG) appropriations bill includes funding for the Department of the Treasury, the Executive Office of the President (EOP), the judiciary, the District of Columbia, and 26 independent agencies. Among the independent agencies funded by the bill are the General Services Administration (GSA), the Office of Personnel Management (OPM), the Small Business Administration (SBA), the Security and Exchange Commission (SEC), and the United States Postal Service (USPS).

On February 14, 2011, President Obama issued his FY2012 budget request. The request included a total of \$49.68 billion for agencies funded through the Financial Services and General Government (FSGG) appropriations bill, an increase of \$3.24 billion over FY2010 enacted appropriations and \$4.93 billion over FY2011 enacted levels. For each title of the regular FSGG appropriations bill, **Table 1** lists the enacted amounts for FY2010, the President's FY2011 request, enacted amounts for FY2011, and the President's FY2012 request. FY2011 enacted amounts may be revised as additional information becomes available.

FY2012 Budget Request by Title

Title I: The Department of the Treasury¹

The President requested \$14.04 billion in total for the Treasury Department for FY2012, an increase of \$573 million over FY2010 enacted funding and \$924 million above FY2011 enacted

Title II: Executive Office of the President²

The President's FY2012 budget request included \$740 million for the Executive Office of the President, a decrease of \$32 million below FY2010 enacted appropriations but \$32 million above FY2011 enacted amounts. The budget request would increase funding for several accounts relative to FY2010 enacted levels, including the National Security Council and Homeland Security Council (+6.9%). **Table 3** shows the enacted amounts for FY2010, the President's budget request for FY2011, enacted amounts for FY2011, and the President's budget request for FY2012.

Title III: The Judiciary³

As a co-equal branch of government, the judiciary presents its budget to the President, who transmits it to Congress unaltered. The FY2012 budget request for \$7.29 billion is \$423 million more than appropriated for FY2010 and \$387 million above FY2011 enacted amounts. **Table 4** shows the enacted amounts for FY2010, the President's budget request for FY2011, enacted amounts for FY2011, and the President's budget request for FY2012.

Title IV: District of Columbia⁴

The President's FY2012 budget request includes \$717 million for special federal payments to the District, a decrease of \$35 million below FY2010 enacted levels and \$17 million more than enacted in FY2011. Table 5 shows the enacted amounts for FY2010, the President's budget request for FY2011, enacted amounts for FY2011, and the President's budget request for FY2012.

Title V: Independent Agencies⁵

The President's FY2012 budget request included \$26.89 billion for independent agencies that receive their funding through the FSGG appropriations bill, an increase of \$2.31 billion over FY2010 enacted levels and \$3.59 billion below FY2011 enacted amounts. **Table 6** shows the enacted amounts for FY2010, the President's budget request for FY2011, enacted amounts for FY2011, and the President's budget request for FY2012.
